#### FEDERAL AGENTS ARREST, DETAIN **ALLEGED CALIFORNIA JAMMER**

They finally got that ...... clown.

Reputed Los Angeles-area repeater jammer and former Amateur Radio licensee Jack Gerritsen was taken off the air and into custody this week. Acting on a criminal complaint, FBI special agents, accompanied by personnel from the FCC Los Angeles Field Office, arrested the 68-year-old Gerritsen without incident early May 5 at his home in Bell, California. Federal agents also confiscated Gerritsen's radio equipment.

"A criminal complaint filed Wednesday afternoon charges Gerritsen with a felony charge of malicious interference with a communications system operated by the United States and a misdemeanor count of transmitting radio signals without a license," said a May 5 statement from the office of Debra W. Yang, US Attorney for the Central District of California. "The two charges carry a potential penalty of 11 years in federal prison."

At an initial court appearance May 5, bond was set at \$250,000 "fully secured." A spokesman in the US Attorney's office explained that Gerritsen will briefly held the call sign KG6IRO as a have to post property or cash to be released, but that it will be several days before the necessary paperwork is ready--assuming that Gerritsen is able to make bail. Once released on bond, Gerritsen would be subject to home detention and barred from possessing any radio equipment, the spokesman said, adding that Gerritsen's house would remain subject to search to make sure.

Unless Gerritsen is indicted beforehand, a preliminary hearing in the case is set for May 25, with arraignment to follow on May 31.

The criminal complaint says an FCC investigation revealed that Gerritsen "transmits his prerecorded political messages and real-time harassment and profanity for hours at a time, often making it impossible for licensed radio operators to use the public frequencies."

\$52,000 in FCC-imposed or proposed forfeitures for alleged interference. In March, the FCC denied a Petition for Reconsideration and upheld a \$10,000 fine against Gerritsen for interfering with Amateur Radio communications.

Gerritsen has yet to pay the fine.

An FBI affidavit sworn out this week in advance of obtaining a search warrant of Gerritsen's residence indicates that FCC agents have been investigating multiple instances of unlawful radio transmissions and malicious interference attributed to Gerritsen over the past four years. They've also spoken with him in person and asked to inspect his station, although earlier FCC documents say he refused that request.

In addition to Amateur Radio repeater communications, Gerritsen is alleged to have interfered with Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS) transmissions. The FCC also reported that it has received complaints from other government agencies that Gerritsen interfered with local and state police and fire agencies, the American Red Cross, the US Coast Guard Auxiliary and other radio services. A MARS training exercise in March had to be canceled as a result of interference attributed to Gerritsen.

Earlier this week, Gerritsen, who Technician licensee and still uses it on the air, was taken into custody by Bell, California, police officers on an unrelated contempt of court citation after violating the terms of a temporary restraining order (TRO) a local radio amateur had obtained to keep Gerritsen off a local repeater. He was released without bond after being held for a few hours and was reported back on area repeaters not long afterward.

Radio amateurs on the West Coast have been complaining for months about the slow pace of enforcement action in the Gerritsen case. Los Angeles-area repeater owners have taken to shutting down their machines to avoid the nearly constant barrage of malicious interference attributed to Gerritsen.

Five years ago, Gerritsen was con-Gerritsen already faces a total of victed in state court of interfering with police radio transmissions and sentenced to 38 months in prison. Following his release in July 2003, the FCC soon began receiving complaints about Gerritsen's activity on the airwaves, according to this week's criminal complaint. From the ARRL LETTER.

#### Highway Louie, SK.

We happened to notice the call **K6HWL** in the silent key section of the May QST. Frank Toles held that call twice. He had a Conditional class license and first appeared in the 1956 Callbook. In about 1979 he upgradeded to a General class. That call vanished about 1983 but showed up again in the 1997 Callbook. He lived in Bethel Island and was also W6AFD at one time.

The holder of K6HWL was known as Highway Louie. He ran a claimed kilowatt mobile on AM and was one of those people who might be called sort of a legend in his own time.

We met him at one of the Fresno Hamfests about 1962, when he drove a black T-Bird which, by that time, Ford had turned into something closer to a T-Boat or T-Barge.

His antenna was a length of chrome plated, six inch exhaust stack topped with a whip and a large (anti) corona cage, which sat on an insulating block several inches thick that looked something like mica. The final was in the trunk and-we're a little hazy on this, too—was a pair of 813s running max power of close to 500 watts in, each, standing straight up on the floor of the trunk. Don't remember what band/s he was set up for. The plate supply came from four dynamotors stacked 2x2 with the outputs connected in series-parallel. These were also in the trunk. You really didn't want to stand too close to that installation; there was no temptation to stick your fingers in there though we assumed an interlock on the trunk lid. Unfortunately we didn't have a camera so this is all dredged up from a 43 year old memory. # Field Day Dave Hodgson, KG6TCJ.

In October of 1987, Peter Wolford, N6IYU, looked up from his desk at the Hamilton Field Marin ARC Clubhouse site, building 549, and said to me, "You passed!" I didn't even realize I was taking the CW portion of the Novice test. I was enrolled in the Novice class under the direction of Peter and Mike Edwards, W6FCQ, two fine teachers. Peter said we would be taking a practice test. We took a break. Then we returned for the technical portion of the class. In those days, classes went on for several weeks, at night for several hours. Peter passed us all on the practice test thereby avoiding our test anxiety. He was a man generous with his time, generous with his humor. When we passed our General class test out at Two Rock Coast Guard Station, he made us epaulets to wear on our shoulders.

Peter was a long time friend of Ron Panton, W6VG, who many of you may know. He is a lifetime member and on the Board of the NCDXC. With a long friendship between Peter and Ron, I asked Ron for his musings on Peter. Here is what he wrote:

#### **Dear Marilyn:**

So sorry our mutual friend is no longer with us. Of course you know that we had a sked on 80 fone every Monday morning. Peter used to say, because of me, he got a ham license. Don't know if that is true. However, we did discover during one of those skeds that we had a mutual contact in the Oakland Symphony around 65 years ago. Peter was playing the bassoon and I the trumpet at the rehearsals and at the concert at the Old Folks Home in Niles or somewhere down in that region, The first trumpet and the 1st bassoon did not show up, so Peter and I were the scapegoats. Needless to say, we fell flat on our faces, trying to fill in for missing hot shots.

Peter knew Helga's (Ron's wife) brother at KCBS where Peter tuned the piano, and I worked in master control. So, Helga's brother talked me into going to the SF Opera house where he sold souvenir programs, and rented out opera glasses. So, I also ushered as Helga was doing, the rest is history, 54 years or so.

Peter and I loved sailing, but he had an old stink pot of a motor boat, about 10 feet long I think. I had a beautiful Star class sail boat. I talked Peter into getting interested in sail boat, rather than little stink pots. He arranged with some guy for us to take the Trimaran. I was shocked, but we went out in SF bay. It got a little windy and the mast snapped off, and we were rescued by the Coast Guard. Boy, did I laugh out loud, and for a long, long time. Peter then got a Tahiti Ketch. Beautiful proper boat. However, one night he left it moored near Santa Cruz, very foggy night, and his beautiful ketch ran aground and was destroyed. Sad. Many more boats were owned by Peter, but none as beautiful as the Tahiti Ketch.

I also presume you knew Peter had only one lung. Blew a very loud bagpipe though. When he was in the SF hospital, I donated some blood for him. When his mother died she remembered me in her will.

I'll see if I can come up with some musings about Pete. Ron Panton, W6VG, and his wife, Helga, who live in Menlo Park, knew him VERY well. Ron and I were on the board of the NCDXC. I just emailed Ron and Helga asking them for some information about Pete. He taught me CW in 1987. Very talented man in other fields: a sailor, had his own boat, sailed up the coast, lost the boat! Played bag pipes. Was a piano tuner. Etc. etc. We'll put our heads together and you can put the finer touches on it.
