Next to it is the CW position. On the far right, in pic #2, is the VHF station, used for the Sunday 10:15 VHF check-in.

Ethanol

For many years a goodly amount of the ethanol produced in this country, and quite a bit produced in places like Scotland, Puerto Rico and several other countries was processed through our livers. Some alcohol, mostly methanol. was used in motor fuel, probably the best known example being in the Offenhauser engines run in the Indie 500 years ago. Those old four-bangers did well, winning the Memorial Day race about 24 times.

The only catch was that the mileage was not very good and much larger quantities of alky were required to do an equivalent amount of work. This year all the Indie cars will run on a methanol/ethanol mix. Next year it'll be straight ethanol and it'll most likely be 'denatured' to prevent us, at least those of us with operational brains, from drinking it. Methanol is already poisonous and can give you the blind staggers, just before it kills you.

We remember ethyl alky from our days in the Navy. It was dyed pink and was known as Pink Lady in some Letter has been sent by the County to places. Alcohol is much safer for use as a motor fuel; it burns cooler with much less pollution. Even the Ford T was originally designed to run on the stuff.
