Board Meeting 18 April

The meeting was called to order by by the President at 19:30. Present were President Dave KG6TCJ; Vice-President/ Treasurer Eric KG6WOU; Secretary Randy KA6BQF: Board Members John KE6ORI: W5ALW: KG6TCM; Kevin Tom AL KF6YUF: Raine KG6GGI: and Frank WA6JTP: Trustees Doug KF6AKU and Augie KØCQL; and QSA-5 Editor K6PHD. The agenda was approved.

The minutes of the March Board of Director's Meeting were approved as published in QSA-5.

Truck Committee Chair John Boyd reported that he had pulled the generator out and had taken it in for service. The shop had not yet looked at it. The Board authorized an expenditure not to exceed some discussion of methods to get the body work done. John also has information on replacement parts and painting prices.

Public Service Chair Randy Jenkins reported that "The Relay" was completed. He still needs volunteers for the Miwok on Mav 6th and the Human Race on May 13.

President Dave Hodgson requested the use of the clubhouse for RACES training.

Under Technical Committee, Trustee Doug Slusher reported that weather and road conditions continue to delay access to the repeater sites for maintenance. Doug is exploring a site for a temporary repeater for public service events. Dave reported one APRS tracker was complete and the other two were under construction.

Old Business: The March financial report, and club expenses in general, were discussed. Committee chairs were asked to estimate their annual expenses. Various expenditures were discussed. A donation box will be put out to help defray the expenses of providing food at the general membership meetings. (We've been eating pretty high on the hog at regular meetings. The March Financial Statement shows an amount of \$157.89 for those snacks at the March 3 meeting. ed.) The annual report is being prepared, and will be reviewed by the board. The status of the expected donation of UHF radios to the club was discussed.

General Meeting 7 April.

The meeting was called to order at 19:30 by President Dave Hodgson, KG6TCJ. Other board members present were; Randy Jenkins, KA6BQF; John Boyd, KE6ORI; K6GWE Trustee Doug Slusher, KF6AKU; and W6SG Trustee August Koehler, KØCQL.

The Agenda was approved as submitted.

Secretary Randy stated that a letter to the upstairs tenant was being drafted, and President Dave stated that he had been in contact with a neighbor, Tanya Kennedy, about the comm truck cover.

President Dave summarized the Board of Directors agenda at the last meeting. Bids were being sought on the roof leak issue. A possible building cleaning contract has been deferred until May. Expenses for 2005 were under review. Donation of a desk for the clubhouse was declined. A donation of UHF radios to the club was being pursued.

Our bookkeeper, Connie Sawtelle, AE6PA reported balances of \$9,015.74 in checking, \$5,510,25 in the repeater CD. \$19,501.18 in the reserve CD, for a total of \$34,027.17. All bills were current, and we were expecting a (very. ed.) large bill for insurance soon.

As Recreation Committee Chair Connie reported that she had reserved the site at Samuel Taylor State Park for the September 23rd Picnic. We need to discuss food for the picnic. No other social events were planned.

Public Service Chair Randy reported on upcoming public service events. includina the Relay on April 8, and the Miwok 100K on May 6. Chuck Deatrick, WA6SQQ, still needed volunteers for the Relay. Randy was soliciting volunteers for the Miwok. The Marin Human Race will take place on May 13.

Trustee Doug made the Technical Report. Things seemed to be going well. The 146.700 repeater still needs to be visited, when weather permits. The antenna may need to be evaluated. The controller on Tam also needs work. P/M on San Pedro Ridge needs to be scheduled. Doug and Dave are working on access issues with sites. Upgrading to a voting system has been deferred. 

ARRL DOCUMENTS FLAWS IN MANASSAS BPL INTERFERENCE **REPORT.** And a n d i t o n o n goes

In response to a report from BPL operator COMTek that claims its BPL system in Manassas, Virginia cannot be shown to be the cause of ongoing interference complaints by local amateurs, the ARRL has documented the report's shortcomings and again has demanded that the FCC shut down the system until the interference problems are solved.

In an April 14, 2006 letter to two FCC officials, ARRL General Counsel Christopher D. Imlay, W3KD, concluded: "In light of the record of long-standing interference to licensed stations in Manassas, and the responses to the Commission's directive: failure of COMTek and the City of Manassas to comply with Section 15.615(d), the Commission should require that the BPL system be shut down immediately, and not resume its operation until the facility is shown to be in full compliance with Commission rules regarding radiated emissions and the non-interference requirement of Section 15.5 of the Commission's rules."

The 10 page letter, addressed to Joseph Casey, Chief, Spectrum Enforcement Division, and Katherine Power, of the Spectrum Enforcement Division, sets forth in detail the "tortured history of interference complaints involving the BPL system.' COMTek's report was submitted to the FCC in response to a letter from Casey to the City of Manassas and COMTek requiring a "report of system compliance and your report of actions taken to address the alleged harmful interference." The report states, "COMTek believes that the current configuration of the Manassas BPL System is not the source of interference to amateur radio licensees." The ARRL response, citing ongoing interference complaints, called the study "fatally and obviously flawed."

Appended to the ARRL letter to the FCC was a detailed analysis of the technical study prepared by ARRL Lab Manager Ed Hare, W1RFI. The analysis concluded: "...the testing that was performed in no way is sufficient to reach any general conclusions about emissions levels." The analysis goes on to criticize the methodology and conclusions of the tests, which were performed by Product Safety Engineering, Inc. Hare's analysis found a number of deficiencies in the PSE report, including:

The testing was not done in accordance with the FCC's recommended test guidelines; The test equipment used -- a spectrum analyzer and a passive loop antenna -was not sufficient to measure notch depth nor to measure the ambient noise levels; PSE tested only one amateur band at a single location, which was insufficient to establish compliance or non-interference; а n The testing does not follow good engineer-

ing practice and is not sufficient to have met the requirements set forth by the FCC for this testing.

The ARRL letter to the FCC concluded: ... The Manassas and COMTek nontheir vague assurances to work with the Amateur Radio operators in the future; and their stonewalling on the cause of the harmful interference should not be tolerated by the Enforcement Bureau and will not be further tolerated by the Amateur Radio community in Manassas, or by ARRL."
