Anyone using the cold water faucet in the clubhouse kitchen will stay dryer as of an early April Sunday afternoon. Randy KA6BQF, with the aid of three stooges: Dave KG6TCJ, Phil K6PHD and Texx Woodworth. (double X?) installed a water pressure reducer/regulator valve on the building's 3/4" line from the street. Randy KA6BQF did a pro job that would stand up to any inspection.

The 125 pounds/inch² that used to wet you down when you opened the cold water tap has been tamed down to a static 65 psi. The MMWD warns users when a significant pressure change is going to occur. We never got that info or it was disregarded, probably a few years ago. The plumbing code, according to the MMWD, requires a reducer if the street supply is over 80 psi. We only discovered the high pressure when a member got curious and measured it.

In Santa Venetia the street pressure was increased from about 90 psi to 140 in two steps with notice given before each increase. We assumed that this was to increase fireflow to houses in the hills above. Cheaper and easier to crank up the street pressure than for the MMWD crew to dig up the street to install a bypass around their own reducer. Same assumption applies on Shell Rd.

NEWINGTON, CT, Apr 17, 2007 --
 The ARRL has been working with the US Department of Defense to develop a plan to mitigate alleged **interference from 70 cm ham radio repeaters to military radar systems on both coasts.** Amateur Radio is secondary to government users from 420 to 450 MHz and must not interfere with primary users. Citing an increasing number of interference complaints, the US Air Force has asked the FCC to order dozens of repeater systems to either mitigate interference to the "PAVE PAWS" radars or shut down. The Commission has not yet responded. The situation affects 15 repeaters within less than 100 miles of Otis Air Force Base on Cape Cod, Massachusetts, and more than 100 repeaters within some 140 miles of Beale Air Force Base near Sacramento, California. ARRL Regulatory Information Specialist Dan Henderson, N1ND, stresses that the Defense Department acknowledges Amateur Radio's value in disasters and emergencies and is being extremely cooperative -- and a wholesale shutdown of US 70 cm Amateur Radio activity is *not* in the offing.

"The ARRL Lab is working up calculations on each repeater system the Air Force has identified to determine where interference-mitigation techniques offer a reasonable chance of keeping the repeater on the air," Henderson says. "In order for the amateur community as a whole to succeed in this venture, it is going to require the cooperation of all affected repeater owners."

A US Air Force contractor identified the problematic repeater systems last summer, but the situation didn't become critical until the Air Force contacted the FCC a month ago. ARRL officials met with Defense Department representatives in late March to discuss alleged interference to the PAVE PAWS radar sites, and this week Henderson contacted Amateur Radio frequency coordinating organizations in both affected areas - the Northern Amateur Relay Council of California (NARCC) and the New England Spectrum Management Council (NESMC).

PAVE PAWS is a missile and satellite detection and tracking system, and its name is a half-acronym. "PAVE" is simply an Air Force program name. "PAWS" stands for "Phased Array Warning System." Although PAVE PAWS has been in existence since the late 1970s, the Cape Cod and Sacramento sites are the only remaining operational facilities in the US.

 PAVE PAWS facilities occupy essentially the entire 70 cm band -- one factor that makes mitigation difficult. Feeding upward of 1800 active antenna elements, the broadband radar transmitters emit an average power output of more than 145 kW.

As a "first step" to mitigate the interference, the ARRL is recommending that all affected repeater owners reduce power -- possibly to as little as 5 W effective radiated power (ERP). "We understand the difficulty this may cause to owners and users," Henderson said, "but the alternative to operating with a smaller coverage area may be not operating at all." Amateur Radio stations already must abide by a maximum 50 W PEP power limitation in the areas around both Air Force facilities.

Henderson says the League is still seeking further information on the problem. "Until the Defense Department accepts a mitigation plan, repeater owners should exercise patience," he cautioned. "Once the ARRL Lab has completed its propagation calculations, we will be in a better position to provide advice for specific repeaters on a case-by-case basis."

Board of Directors Meeting, 4/12/07

The meeting was called order by President Denice Stoops at 1926 hrs.

Based on the Secretary's recollection, the following board members were present: Denice Stoops, Dave Hodgson, Phil Dunlap, Randy Jenkins, Rich Carbine, Al Weisman, Norm Baetz, and Trustee Doug Slusher.

Secretary Randy reported on incoming communications from the Dolphin Swimming and Boating Club, and the County Registrar of Voters.

Treasurer Dave gave his report. The account summaries for March show \$3010 in income and \$685.64 in expenses. Dave was transferring money out of the general checking account and into certificates of deposit so that more interest could be earned. He was also consolidating certain certificates of deposit, again so that a higher rate of interest could be earned. At the request of the current building manager, the separate building checking account would be closed. Dave also reported on the upcoming insurance payment due soon.

Membership Committee: Phil Dunlap reported that dues were still trickling in. At this point we had approximately 100 members. Beginning soon, QSA 5 will be produced and distributed in electronic/PDF format, unless otherwise requested.

Recreation Committee: Our original location choice for our Christmas party was San Rafael Joe's for December 9. To hold that date, we had made a \$200 refundable deposit. As of late April the location has been changed to the Deer Park Villa in Fairfax and the deposit has been refunded. The date is now December 2.

Public Service Committee: Randy Jenkins reported that we have the Miwok 100, The Relay, and The Human Race coming up in May. We have yet to be contacted by The Human Race, and it was suggested that that might be an event we could forgo.

Technical Committee: Doug Slusher reported on continuing contact with an MMWD about the Tiburon and Tam West sites.

Comm Truck Committee: Dave Hodgson reported that we need to tie down the fabric on the cover for the Comm Truck, the bungees have failed. Doug Slusher reported that the 100 W UHF radio was ready for installation back into the truck, and that mounting plates were being fabricated for the radios in the front console. There was a discussion about costs for operating and maintaining the comm truck. Rich Carbine asked for a spreadsheet of costs to operate the truck for the past five years. Dave Hodgson gave an accounting of this year's projected costs and will produce a report based upon the available data. Rich also asked about projected costs for radios for the truck. Doug Slusher reported that any radios

VE Liaison: Al Weisman reported that the next session would be held on Saturday, June 2.

RACES Liaison: Dave Hodgson reported that the new memorandum of understanding was currently under review by the County Attorney.

Building Committee: Building Manager Carbine reported on a bid from Lowry Construction totaling \$69,000. The scope of work to be performed included remediation of the leaks, correction of dry rot and other structural problems on the east side of the building, remodeling of the restrooms, including bringing one restroom up to ADA standards, relocating the water heater, and refinishing the kitchen and office areas. The bid did not include any electrical work, which Rich proposes to do in-house. The price of the bid can be substantially reduced if the club chooses to do much of the finish work in-house. We will continue to solicit bids.

Old Business: Kids Day - Deferred until the May meeting. Culvert Repair - Doug Slusher will get a price on the piece of pipe that we need. Field Day - No change. RedEx equipment will be staged at the Marin clubhouse.

New Business: A condolence card will be sent to Merriam, the wife of longtime member, Leo Bodian K6BAQ. Uncle Leo died on 23 March.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2048 hrs.

Secretary Jenkins reported on incoming communications; a letter from the Registrar of Voters, and a letter from the Dolphin Swimming and Boating Club.

President Denice Stoops reported on the activities from the March board meeting. A thank you letter for a donation of the Heathkit radio was reported to have been mailed.
