**Board of Directors Meeting, Thursday, December 13, 2007**

Board members present: Rich Carbine, August Koehler, Norm Baetz, Tom Jordan, Phil Dunlap, Dave Hodgson, Doug Slusher, Randy Jenkins.

The meeting was called to order at 19:45 hours by Secretary Randy Jenkins.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted by e-mail.

No printed agenda was available; the meeting was conducted in the order as listed on last month's agenda.

**Communications:** Jenkins reported on two thank-you letters / receipts for donations.

**Treasurer** Hodgson submitted three reports; the November monthly account summaries, the 2007 profit and loss statement, and the proposed 2008 budget. Income for November was \$5,250.00. Expenses for November were \$20,876.99. All CDs had been cashed in, and the net balance in the checking account was \$2965.11. All bills due to the contractors had been paid. The profit and loss statement for 2007 showed total income of \$30,818.00, and total expenses of \$65,856.10. Total construction costs were \$48,208.98. The Board of Directors discussed the 2008 proposed budget which included projected income of \$28,320, and projected expenses of \$26,760.

There was a discussion about increasing the membership dues. An increase of \$5-\$10 was discussed, to be presented at the next general membership meeting. It was moved by board member Carbine and seconded by board member Baetz to approve the 2008 budget as submitted.

Public Service Committee: we have already been contacted by the Miwok 100 and Holstein 100 with dates for 2008. Dave Hodgson is encouraging CERT members to assist us in providing communication for the Dipsea.

Technical Committee, Doug Slusher has been in contact with Dan Healy who is willing to help us with installation of the tone boards at the remote sites for the Big Rock system. The tone boards may already be in place,

**stated in the radio convention which just specified a signal of three dots, three dashes, three dots, sent as one continuous group.**

**No mention was made of "SOS" at all at the Berlin Convention or in the Marconi circular letters.**

Also the mention of "can't hear because of steam" would have been in response to a signal sent by someone else. There were NO other signals at all on the recording, nor were there any atmospheric heard. The speed is too high and is contrary to what Harold Bride (2nd R/O) testified to later."

**Titanic Distress Call, Real or Faked?**

At the MARS Christmas party at the Deer Park Villa an audio CD was played purporting to be a true copy of the distress call sent by the Titanic on 14 April 1912. Some controversy has ensued among members of the Radio Officers group on this subject.

Following are some comments on the legitimacy of the recording.

"Thanks for all the wonderful answers about the SOS recording of the Titanic.

There were only a few who thought it was real. Most thought it was false, some for the keying speed, some for other reasons which we will investigate later in this email.

Regarding the keying, many thought it was a Vibroplex, however two people reported that they could and can send with a straight key at that speed and that the keying in the recording was that of a straight key. I know some whom I've heard on the air - TG9ADM comes to mind—he is a young man - less than 20 years of age - and he sends with an Ameco straight key - also known as a Japanese JJ38 key. He can send 25 to 28 wpm. I've heard him.

The other objection to the sending is the shortness of the dashes. However, Phillips was a former wire telegrapher and they used a short dash - about 2:1 ratio to speed up the transmissions. Also I've found that when sending fast on a hand key -- "something" has to go to get the speed - it's either the spacing of the length of the code elements - mostly the dash.

In support of it being a fake were mentioned the "highly unlikely" possibility of MCE having an Edison Dictaphone - even if they realized they had a "news story" and made a telegraph or telephone call - who are they going to call that has such a machine? This is Newfoundland - not New York City. However because of Newfoundland's significant geographic location with respect to Europe, it had significant telegraph coverage - if not telephone coverage. The trans-Atlantic telegraph cable was at Heart's Content, NF to Valencia

(where present coast station EJK is located).

Some interesting reading on Newfoundland early communications is at the bottom of the news release. <http://www.releases.gov.nl.ca/releases/1997/tcr/0324N04.HTM>

Others question the non-fading of the signal. A signal from 300 miles or less - as was the distance from Titanic to Cape Race doesn't exhibit the quick fading of the HF bands, but if it does fade, it does so gradually often with the time of day - however 300 miles or less was almost always solid copy with modern equipment. But most noticed that the signal was "too loud" - I agree if the call was received with such a strong signal, it would have been received "somewhere" barely received - but heard. It wasn't. Cape Race copied it fairly faintly.

I will close by giving the email from Canadian Radio Historian, Spud Roscoe, VE1BC:

On Dec 16, 2007 1:52 PM, Spud Roscoe. Here is my 2 cents worth.

It has to be a fake because none of the old boys I interviewed 35 years ago that were there mentioned it. The DF station on Cape Race had call sign VAZ and Ray Bridger operated that in 1919. He modulated a transmitter with a gramophone and received several reports on the signal from passing passenger ships. If there had been a recording like this these old boys would have mentioned it. Unfortunately they have all been dead at least 20 years now.

Another thing I have been given is a typewritten log for this incident. Again false. The original logs burned when the MCE/VCE station burned in 1919. **I knew the log was a fake as soon as I saw it because it was not written in the radio language of the day.**

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to one and all! 73 Spud VE1BC Halifax, Nova Scotia.

So I conclude - with your help - that it is a fake.

**GIFT WRAPPING TIPS FOR MEN**

This is the time of year when we think back to the very first Christmas, when the Three Wise Men; Gaspar, Balthazar and Herb, went to see the baby Jesus and, according to the Book of Matthew, "presented unto Him gifts; gold, frankincense, and myrrh".

These are simple words, but if we analyze them carefully, we discover an important, yet often overlooked, theological fact: There is no mention of wrapping paper.

If there had been wrapping paper, Matthew would have said so: "And lo, the gifts were inside 600 square cubits of paper. And the paper was festooned with pictures of Frosty the Snowman. But these words do not appear in the Bible, which means that the very first Christmas gifts were NOT wrapped. This is because the people giving those gifts had two important characteristics: 1. They were wise. 2. They were men.

Men are not big gift wrappers. Men do not understand the point of putting paper on a gift just so somebody else can tear it off. This is not just my opinion: This is a scientific fact based on a statistical survey of two guys I know.

### Amateur Radio Operators Gain New LF Band

At the now concluded World Radiocommunications Conference in Geneva, Switzerland; a worldwide secondary allocation of 135.7-137.8 kHz was approved. This marks the first time since allocations to radio services began that the amateur service has had an allocation below the medium-wave broadcasting band. The effective date is not yet set, and, in any case, Amateur Radio operators must wait until their own administrations authorize the new allocation before they can use it.

At the time of writing, hopes of an allocation near 5 MHz had faded.

Future World Radiocommunications Conferences are tentatively scheduled for 2011 and 2015. One tentative agenda item for 2011 is a secondary allocation of about 15 kHz around 500 kHz. Not on the schedule is any more talk about a new 5 MHz Amateur Radio band.
