ONELRAD, which stood for ntrol of Electromagnetic Radias", had its embryonic start in Deber, 1951 when President Harry nan signed an Executive Order diing the FCC to set up a security sysfor all civilian radio services. oughout 1952, CONELRAD was eloped and tested and, by early 3, it was ready. The purpose of NELRAD was to relay Civil Dee information to the public without wing enemy aircraft to use our radio als as a beacon for their direction ng equipment. In the event of an emergency, all FM, TV and most AM stations would proceed with the following alarm sequence: Next page

CONELRAD was becoming obsolete. Thus, in the autumn of 1962, CONEL- RAD was replaced by the Emergency Broadcast System. Ironically, CONEL- RAD disappeared right around the time it might have been needed the mostthe Cuban Missile Crisis. As the 1960's wore on, the Cold War gradually dissipated, and the Specter of imminent enemy attack disappeared. Today, only the faded "Fallout Shelter" signs, and those triangular markings on old AM radios remain to remind us of CONELRAD and the Cold War. As I write this, I can hear a Springfield Mass station on 640 kHz, while a heterodyne of Class 4 stations co-mingles on 1240. And yet, what is that I hear, faintly in the background??
