In order for people to improve their operating skills we want to encourage this. To that end we have developed an online tool for running the net. This tool is intended to help out in a number of ways. First you can sign up in advance so we know someone is intending to run the net on a particular day.

We want you to sign up four weeks in advance so as I write this on the 25th of January the first open signup is February 16th. When you sign up your email address will show up in the list. On the Saturday before the net you will receive an email reminder with a link that will take you to the online tool. The tool includes a script for running the net. The club QST for the week, and of course the roll call. We also want to track where people are checking in from, although this is not required.

You can use the tool in a couple of ways. You can use the web page to record people's check in and location. Alternately you can print out the most recent roll call and fill it in with a pen. Later you can enter the roll on the web. We will be putting a computer in the shack at the club house. I will demonstrate the application at the February 7th membership meeting. I urge you to visit our web site and check out the new and revised Club Nets page.

What's Happening in Radio

SouthWest Ohio DX Association trademarks DX terms

The club has trademarked "DX Dinner" and "DX pedition of the Year" preventing other clubs from using these terms. Many hams have responded to this on message boards and blogs stating their opposition to such a practice.

Propagation Forecast

Solar activity weakened during the first part of January. The solar flux dropped to a low of 112 for the January 21-23 period. Toward the end of this month it is forecast to rise and peak in February at 180.

Alpha Amplifiers Maintains Support for older models

After announcing they were dropping repair of their older amplifiers, Alpha Amplifiers has reversed course for some models. "We'll continue to fix our amplifiers as long as we can. We will continue to offer repairs on the Alpha 91b, 99, 89 and 87A amplifiers - as long as we can get the parts.

FCC News

The number of ham radio operators continues to grow in the US. As of 12/31/13 the FCC database had 717,201 licenses, which are up from 709,575 at the end of 2012. A breakdown by license class shows Technicians as the largest group, at 349,163, followed by Generals at 167,257, Amateur Extras at 133,391, and Advanced licensees at 54,293. Slightly more than 13,000 Novice licensees remain on record too. The FCC no longer issues the Novice or Advanced class license. Technician numbers have grown by 8.2 percent over the past decade, with an impressive comeback since 2007 after the population had plummeted from a peak of 338,334 in March 2000. The General class population has risen by slightly more than 18 percent over the past 10 years. But the Amateur Extra class has shown the most remarkable growth over the past decade, climbing by slightly more than 27 percent. FCC-issued club station licenses are also at an all-time high in the FCC database at 11,363.

USS Pampanito Report

The DDO for Saturday, January 11, 2014 took place aboard the USS Pampanito starting around 1045 hours. It was a single operator effort this time. I was able to make a number of QSO's on the 40 and 17 meter bands. The best DX of the day was on 17 meter CW with K3Y/KH6 in Hawaii and JH2X/2in Japan. Radio conditions on the 40 meter band were poor with an S7 noise level and a troublesome "squeegee" parked right on 7260 kc. I think a good part of the interference that we pick up on the boat is associated with the nearby SF trolley system. In spite of the S7 noise level, several QSO's were made on 40 meter SSB. No other museum ships were heard on or around 7260 kc this time around.

All in all it was a fairly quite day aboard the boat. The only real excitement was provided by a gal who dropped her iPad through a space between one of the engines and a floor plate. The iPad landed below on the second deck and had to be fetched by one of the Docents from the Watch Shack. In general, the visitor traffic was light with relatively few groups of visitors. I secured NJ6VT a little after 1500 hours. Your CO was getting cold!

I wish we had more participation aboard the boat for these DDO's. Single handed operations aboard the boat are not the best way to go and a second RO is really needed. The radio club needs your help, so please consider volunteering some time to help out. Our next scheduled DDO is set for Saturday, February 8, 2014. Let me know if you can help out!

ARRL Centennial QSO Party

The ARRL Centennial QSO Party is a year-long operating event that celebrates hams making contacts. In the end you will have accumulated points, worked new stations and made new friends all over the world.

The Centennial QSO Party is made-up of two main activities: (1) W1AW operating portable in each state and most territories; and (2) The Centennial Points Challenge which is the accumulation of points from qualifying contacts made throughout 2014. To have a score listed online in the Points Challenge competition, logs must be submitted through the Logbook of the World (LoTW) system.

W1AW will be on the air from every state and most territories, and it will be easy to work WAS working only W1AW portable operations. This is the first ARRL-sponsored operating event where every member is worth at least one point, so work as many points as you can during 2014! Earn awards based upon points, working all states or working W1AW portable in every state and territory.

Would you like to serve as a Volunteer Examiner?

Some of us remember when we had to travel to an FCC field office, in order to test to upgrade your license. There was an office in San Francisco, it was open on certain weekdays, and candidates could only test, one time in a month.

The adoption of the Volunteer Examiner program made it simpler and more convenient for people to obtain or upgrade their license. Licensed amateurs who hold a General Class or higher can be accredited by a Volunteer Exam Coordinator to be a Volunteer Examiner. You have to apply, and must pass an open-book test. Our team has members who are accredited by the ARRL-VEC. We usually hold exams three to four times a year, at the clubhouse.
