

## NOAA Updates Solar Cycle 25 Prediction

Frank Donovan, W3LPL, notes that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Space Weather Prediction Center (SWPC) has published its official updated prediction of Solar Cycle 25 in new, interactive Solar Cycle Progression graphs. The updated



prediction is based on

the results of NOAA's Solar Cycle 25 Prediction Panel.

"SWPC forecasts a solar maximum between 105 and 125, with the peak occurring between November 2024 and March 2026," Donovan said. "There is broad consensus that solar minimum is ongoing this year -- or may have already occurred -- and that Cycle 25 will have no major change in the level of solar activity compared to Cycle 24."

## ARRL Suggests Taking a Creative Approach to Field Day 2020

This year, ARRL Field Day promises to be a unique iteration of this annual event, with many individuals and groups coming up with new and interesting ways to adjust their approach. As an event, Field Day is structured to be versatile and can be adapted for any situation.

Many groups have asked how they can adjust their Field Day planning to address social-distancing guidelines that may be in effect in many areas of the country, as gathering at their traditional Field Day site may not be feasible or safe. Instead of participating in a group event this year, consider operating as a Class B, C, D, or E station, utilizing your own call sign.

ARRL will include club names for all participating stations in the published results, so the efforts of your club's members can be acknowledged. While we will not publish an aggregate club score, seeing the name of your club associated with various individual member's results is certainly a way to highlight your club's activity.

Myriad opportunities are possible in this year's Field Day setting. A few options are as follows:

- Consider having an intra-club competition among members, seeing who can make the most contacts during the event. You can award prizes or distribute certificates at a club meeting. This can be a fun way to bolster the activities of individual club members, even though they cannot all gather together at the same location this year.
- Set up a Field Day Challenge with rival clubs in neighboring communities. See how many members of each club get on the air from their own stations and participate in the event. In addition to "bragging rights," perhaps certificates to the top-scoring individual entries in each category can be presented as part of this inter-club camaraderie.

As Donovan explained, for many years the SWPC's solar cycle predictions have used the Royal Observatory of Belgium's International Sunspot Number. SWPC's official solar cycle prediction now uses the SWPC sunspot number. The International Sunspot Number is typically about onethird lower than the SWPC sunspot number.

While this is SWPC's official Cycle 25 prediction, it's important to note there is still divergence among various forecasting methods and members of the space weather forecasting community," Donovan said. "Most forecasts and forecasters agree that the Cycle 25 peak is likely to be within ±20% of Cycle 24 and is likely to occur between 2024 and 2027."

Membership:

#### Presentation:

Marcel Stieber, AI6MS, made a presentation on the ARKNet Wireless Emergency Network that has been installed in Cupertino in partnership with the city. It is a Part 15, as opposed to Part 97, system which requires no ham license to operate or maintain. It is a point to multi-point system that uses new technology to support voice (using regular commercial type phones), data and real-time video monitoring operating totally off the grid using various emergency power sources. Their remote sites use solar power. It uses Mikro-Tik equipment and is designed to be the go-to system when commercial power and communications systems go down. The ARKs are communications sites located in or next to City offices, facilities and first responder locations. The next project is the HF antenna base when the weather improves. Steve Smith has installed a new electronic entry lock on the clubhouse. Key fobs will be distributed to selected members in lieu of keys. The lock will still operate with metal keys which will be for emergency use only. The lock will be rekeyed as there are too many keys in circulation for adequate security for the building. Doug also reported that there is work to be done on the Mt. Tam repeater, which cannot be done until access to the site can be arranged with the Rangers. The road has been closed due to the virus pandemic. Milt reported that we have found a very good repeater site in Novato. It was used to great success during the RACES exercise last week. Negotiations for an agreement have been started with the North Marin Water District for use of the site but have been slowed by limited work schedules under the shelter in place order.

<u>RACES</u>: Jay Hubert reported that the EOC has been activated on a limited basis due to the virus pandemic. The focus has been on providing health and human services and they have been trying to keep everyone else out, including RACES as there have been two Covid virus cases among the staff there.

#### 9. Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order at 7:34 pm by Curtis Ardourel.

The agenda, as amended to add a discussion about insurance, was adopted.

## 2. Approve minutes:

Minutes of the March 12, 2020, board meeting were approved without objection.

## 3. Treasurer's Report:

Ed Essick circulated by e-mail the club's profit and loss statement which will be published in the next QSA-5. Income tax materials for the past year have been sent to the accountant. The club's return is due in May.

## 4. Secretary's Report (External Communications):

Our semi-annual bill for insurance has been received and will be given to Ed to pay on Friday. Correspondence sent to Cal Anbar in October was returned—need to get an address update from him for out records. A packet of QSL cards was received for W6SG from the Region 6 QSL coordinator. They will be placed in the radio room at the club house.

Milt reported that he updated the California corporate registration for MARS with the Secretary of State.

## 5. Membership Chair Report:

Curtis reported that 118 members are current for this year, 86% of total paid membership at the end of last year. A dunning letter was sent to members from last year who have not renewed as of the end of March. This brought a flurry of payments in the past week. Membership cards for 2020 will be distributed to paid-up members shortly.

## 6. Facilities:

- a. MARS' tenant, Sharon Miller, has been checking on the clubhouse space during the shelter in place and has reported that all is well with the building. Doug will prepare a closed sign for Milt to post on the clubhouse door. Marc Bruvry checked the interior after the last rain storm and it appears that there are no leaks and the leak situation was apparently cured by the deck resurfacing.
- b. Doug reported that as soon as the shelter in place is lifted, key fobs for the new door lock will be issued to selected members and the door lock will be rekeyed. The new key will be for emergency entry and first responders only and only a few copies will be made. He is also looking into replacing the sliding door to the storage area in the rear with a conventional door that can be used as an emergency exit.
- c. Crown-Castle has contacted Doug to state that they are reviewing our request for installation of a MARS repeater in their site on Big-Rock and will get back to him. Milt reported that he has been in contact with the NMWD concerning the proposed repeater site in Novato, but they have not had a chance to get agreement papers to him due to the shelter-in-place order impact on their staffing.

## 7. Field Day:

Field Day 2020 is in limbo at this point. Marin Rod and Gun Club closed for the duration of the shelter-in-place and our check for rent of space there for this year's field day has not been issued yet. If it is going forward, we will also have to secure insurance certification for the event. Curtis will check with Bill Hillendahl to determine ARRL's position with respect to the conduct of event this year in light of shelter-in-place.

## 8. Old business:

- a. Public Service Web Pages: Curtis is working with Dale Komai to resolve technical issues in the website that developed during Dale's work on upgrade of the Public Service Web pages. Work on fixes are on the back burner now due to the shelter-in-place order.
- b. COVID-19: MARS will continue to have virtual meetings, only, to be conducted on Zoom for the duration of the shelter-in-place order. Milt will review the type of notice of meeting required under the bylaws, but meeting notices and log-in information will posted in QSA-5 and on the MARS website for the duration of the crisis pending any demonstrated need for more notice.
- c. Insurance: Milt reported that our most recent insurance policy does not include Directors and Officers coverage as was originally discussed when seeking a new insurance policy. Such coverage would provide insurance coverage and defense for directors and officers against individual claims arising out of their performance of duties on behalf of the club, but would cost about \$1000 to

2000 more. Although it was pointed out that the Board and its officers take very few actions that could potentially expose them to legal action, there was enough concern to merit exploring such coverage further.

It was M/S/A that Milt is directed to obtain a proposal for D & O insurance coverage for MARS directors and officers and bring the bid back to the Board for review and further consideration.

## 17. Facilities Chair:

Doug has been compiling a punch list for the contractor to work on from the roof replacement. Most notable are the cable and phone line boxes that need to the reattached to the front facia.

Steve Smith has completed installation of the new electronic lock on the front door.

Doug will program fobs which will be issued to the Board and selected members. A policy will be established for who will be entitled to a fob. Metal master keys will be retained for use by police and fire in case of emergencies.

Doug has contacted Paul Mason, W5ANT, a well known expert on repeater systems, to assist us in resolving the issues with our Tam repeater, most notably the desense problem. Doug, Rob Rowlands and Steve Wilson have all had a hand in working on the problem. Because of wiring issues between the preamp and the receiver, the previous measurements taken are not reliable and will have to be redone. The Repeater Committee will be revisiting the site within the next 10 days to two weeks. The next Technical Committee meeting is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday March 18, 7:30 pm at the Clubhouse.

Milt reported that progress has been made on locating a new repeater site in Novato. Four sites have been visited and tested. The North Marin Water District has been contacted with regard to one of their tank locations. The location we identified was not satisfactory to them because they don't have the infrastructure or the power source to support a repeater system, but offered another site as an alternative. Doug and Milt visited the site and determined that it may even be better than the original choice. Further testing will be done at the site and Milt will follow up with NMWD on a formal agreement for access to the site.

#### 18. Old Business:

- a. It was observed that the changes and improvements to the Public Service pages in our website have created some errors and problems elsewhere in the site. Curtis reported that he will undertake to fix those problems in the very near future.
- b. Arrangements have been made for members to order club name badges on line. As soon as it is determined how payment for the badges will be made, the process will be published to the membership.

## 19. New Business:

a. The final version of the MARS/RACES MOU has been returned executed from the Marin County Office of Emergency Services management, requiring only formal approval by the Board and execution by MARS' President.

It was **M/S/A** that the MOU between MARS and RACES be approved and that President Curtis Ardourel be authorized to execute same.

b. Concern was raised about the wisdom of continuing to hold full membership meetings in view of the COVID-19 health crisis. It was noted that the demographic of our membership is in the high risk group for the disease.

Curtis reported that 106 members are current for 2020, 77% of 2019 year-end membership.

## 29. Education Committee:

Curtis reported that Jamie has agreed to the license training dates posted on the website. He will be making assignments of presentation topics to instructors in the next month.

## 30. Facilities Chair:

Doug has been compiling a punch list for the contractor to work on from the roof replacement. Most notable are the cable and phone line boxes that need to the reattached to the front facia.

Steve Smith has completed installation of the new electronic lock on the front door.

Doug will program fobs which will be issued to the Board and selected members. A policy will be established for who will be entitled to a fob. Metal master keys will be retained for use by police and fire in case of emergencies.

Doug has contacted Paul Mason, W5ANT, a well known expert on repeater systems, to assist us in resolving the issues with our Tam repeater, most notably the desense problem. Doug, Rob Rowlands and Steve Wilson have all had a hand in working on the problem. Because of wiring issues between the preamp and the receiver, the previous measurements taken are not reliable and will have to be redone. The Repeater Committee will be revisiting the site within the next 10 days to two weeks. The next Technical Committee meeting is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday March 18, 7:30 pm at the Clubhouse.

Milt reported that progress has been made on locating a new repeater site in Novato. Four sites have been visited and tested. The North Marin Water District has been contacted with regard to one of their tank locations. The location we identified was not satisfactory to them because they don't have the infrastructure or the power source to support a repeater system, but offered another site as an alternative. Doug and Milt visited the site and determined that it may even be better than the original choice. Further testing will be done at the site and Milt will follow up with NMWD on a formal agreement for access to the site.

## 31. Old Business:

a. It was observed that the changes and improvements to the Public Service pages in our website have created some errors and problems elsewhere in the site. Curtis reported that he will undertake to fix those problems in the very near future.

b. Arrangements have been made for members to order club name badges on line. As soon as it is determined how payment for the badges will be made, the process will be published to the membership.

## 32. New Business:

a. The final version of the MARS/RACES MOU has been returned executed from the Marin County Office of Emergency Services management, requiring only formal approval by the Board and execution by MARS' President.

It was **M/S/A** that the MOU between MARS and RACES be approved and that President Curtis Ardourel be authorized to execute same.

b. Concern was raised about the wisdom of continuing to hold full membership meetings in view of the COVID-19 health crisis. It was noted that the demographic of our membership is in the high risk group for the disease.

It was **M/S/A** that the April MARS General Membership Meeting be cancelled due to the COVID-19 health emergency and that the meeting schedule will resume in May subject to further developments and review. Curtis will prepare a letter to the membership explaining the situation and our policy concerning determination of the health threat to the membership.
